Student Picture Day -- Friday, September 14th

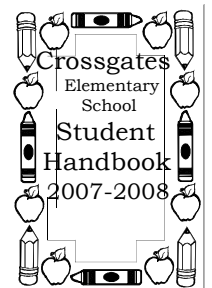
Your child will have the opportunity to have his/her picture taken at school on Friday, September 14, 2007. Information about picture packages and cost will be sent home with your child soon.

STUDENT HANDBOOKS

Your child should be bringing home a "Student Handbook" with a light green cover that looks like the one to the right. This book has important information in it and we encourage you to go through it and keep it handy for reference.



STUDENT PLANNERS

Students in grades 1-6 have been provided with a Student Planner. These colorful, full-size 8 ½ by 11 spiral bound books were purchased with funds from our Parents' Club. They are a terrific way for students and parents to keep track of school assignments and other activities at school. **We encourage parents to check these planners at home daily.**

As stated above, each student in grades 1-6 has received one planner **free of charge.**

The cost to replace a lost or damaged planner is \$3.00. Kindergarten students will receive a blue vinyl folder to be used for carrying school papers and notices to and from school.

6th Grade Camp

Each year 6th grade students attend Outdoor Education "Sixth Grade Camp". This is when they spend a week at Camp Storer in Michigan. The cost for this week at camp this year is \$124.00 and is due no later than November 5, 2007. Crossgates 6th graders will be attending camp November 12-16, 2007. Sixth grade students will have their first orientation meeting on Wednesday, October 17, 2007, at 9:30 AM in their classrooms. **(I am supplying sixth grade parents with this information now so you can plan the cost of this week at camp into your budget.)**

As long as students are not crossing busy streets, they may have to walk a block or so to catch a bus.

GRANDPARENTS' DAY

On Tuesday, September 11, 2007, from 8:00-8:45 AM, all of our Crossgates grandparents are welcome to attend a Parents' Club sponsored doughnuts and coffee breakfast in the cafeteria. After the breakfast you are invited to walk your grandchild to their classroom to spend a few minutes so they can show you where they spend their day. After the morning announcements we would like you to join us for our annual "9/11 Memorial" around the flagpole in front of the school. At the conclusion of this ceremony you can say your good-byes to your grandchildren so they can enter the building to begin their school day.

Back to School Reminders & New Information

As we begin another new school year, we would like to remind all of our families of some issues that will ensure the safety of all of our students and help maintain a positive learning environment.

- **Crossgates School and all other TPS elementary schools now have security cameras and intercoms at entry doors. This means that each school day, beginning at 9:00 AM, ALL DOORS WILL BE LOCKED and visitors to the building will need to have the doors unlocked remotely from the school office. The two doors equipped with the cameras and door buzzers are: The second door from the right at our main front doors, with the buzzer on the wall to the right of this door, and the door on the left in the rear of the building, off the parking lot, that enters the hallway between the cafeteria and the office. The buzzer at this door is on the wall to the left. **SPECIAL NOTE: When you ring this buzzer on either intercom, our secretary will be able to see you on a monitor in the office and speak with you over the intercom. She will then be able to unlock the door. If she happens to be away from her desk at the time, you may have a slight wait until she arrives back to the area near the monitor in the main office.****
- We ask that all visitors to our building report to the main office before visiting any other area of our building. **THIS INCLUDES VISITING OUR "PORTABLE" CLASSROOMS.** If your child forgets a lunch, etc., please bring the item to the main office and we will make sure your child gets it.
- If you have handouts for groups such as girl scouts, brownies, cub scouts, etc. we strongly urge that they be handed out at regularly scheduled meeting times. On the rare occasion when they cannot, we ask that they be brought to the office before 8:45 AM. Please put the children's names on them. We will do the best we can to make sure they are passed out to the students before the end of the day.
- Announcements are made in the morning between 9:00 and 9:05 AM. If you would like us to make a general announcement about a meeting cancellation or meeting time change, please get the information to the main office before 8:45 AM.
- Please do not drive into the horseshoe drive to drop students off or pick them up between the hours of 8:30 and 9:30 AM and 2:30 and 3:30 PM. This drive is reserved for our buses and we do not want traffic in the drive when buses are loading or unloading. **In addition, please do not drive into the faculty parking lot to drop students off and pick them up.** Each class is assigned a door to enter, usually at the front of the building. Dropping them off in back would necessitate them walking around the school to enter the building. Please stop at the curb on Shadylawn and ask your child to walk on the sidewalk, which borders the horseshoe drive to walk to their assigned entry door. It is a good idea to use the sidewalk even when you are with them. This will help them get in the habit of using this safe path when you cannot be with them.
- During the first week of each month, a Crossgates Courier, like the one you are reading now, will be sent home with your child. Please take time to read it so you can stay informed of activities at school. In addition to the Courier, a monthly lunch menu and school calendar of events will also be sent home.
- Please do not send items such as birthday party invitations, etc. to school with your child to be passed out to selected children in class. This causes many hurt feelings of the students in class who may not be invited. Please help us by taking care of this outside of school.
- For the first few days of school, we welcome parents to walk their child into school if it helps alleviate fears a child may have about attending school. After the first few days, we encourage parents to allow their child to begin entering school by themselves. Many times after attending class for a few days, they realize school is not so bad. If your child continues to be afraid, do not minimize or dismiss the fear as being silly. Do not belittle them, but talk to them about their feelings and help them work through this fear. The sooner this can be accomplished, the better. If school personnel can be of assistance, please do not hesitate to ask for help in the office.
- Please send a note to school with your child if he or she is to go home a different way than they normally would. For example if mom or dad are going to pick them up instead of taking the bus.
- If your child forgets his or her lunch or lunch money, they can charge a lunch or milk at school. All we ask is that the charge is paid the next school day.
- As most of you may know, we have two microwave ovens in our cafeteria, which can be used to warm-up lunch items. Remembering that lunch periods only last 30 minutes please do not send in items that need to be heated more than a minute to a minute and a half. Sometimes as many as 20 students have items to be warmed and this cuts down on the time students have to eat if they must wait too long for food to be warmed. **SPECIAL NOTE!** Many of the Lunchable brand items that students want warmed-up are more easily handled by the smaller children if they can put these items on a paper plate. We **do not** provide paper plates at school, so you may want to add a folded or rolled paper plate in lunch bags to help your son or daughter.
- **Glass bottles are not allowed in the cafeteria.** This is because of the safety hazard they may cause if dropped by little hands.

We appreciate the time you have taken to read all of the above reminders. Please remember that we want to make Crossgates the best school it can possibly be. Your children are the reason for our existence. Together we can make sure they are successful in school. We welcome your comments, suggestions and questions. Our door is always open.

2006 Crossgates Quilt Raises Money for Charity

Mrs. Pertcheck's sixth grade class from the 2006-2007 designed and made a quilt that was donated to the annual Black Swamp Auction. The quilt raised \$250.00 at the auction this June. The auction is held every year at the Fulton County fairgrounds in Wauseon, Ohio. The auction items include quilts and many other crafted practical and artistic products. All items are donated. Money raised from the auction goes to the worldwide Mennonite charities. These include the Sunshine Children's Home, located in nearby Monclova Township, that provides services for a wide variety of severely physically and mentally challenged young people. Although mostly quilts are auctioned, many other artistic and practical items are put up for sale as well.

Mrs. Pertcheck established this charitable activity for several reasons. "First of all," she stated, "the students learn to give of themselves in order to help others who are less fortunate. Secondly, this gives creative students a positive outlet for their special skills and talents. Finally, designing and working on the quilt reinforces measuring and geometric skills which are objectives that are on current statewide achievement tests," Mrs. Pertcheck concluded.

The 2006-2007 quilt was designed by Robert Santillan, Kelsey Horn and Courtney Moeller. Along with the designers, all of the other sixth graders in Mrs. Pertcheck's class contributed time and stitches to completing the quilt. Mrs. Pertcheck thanks all of those who helped.



After School Bowling

The after school bowling program some Crossgates students participate in after school is **NOT** a school sponsored activity.

Southwyck Lanes is in charge of this program and only uses the school as a pick-up and drop-off point. Any questions or problems concerning this program should be discussed directly with Southwyck Lanes.

LUNCH PROGRAM

As of the writing of this newsletter the cost of a lunch at school is still \$1.40. Breakfast costs 60 cents. If students pack their lunch they can buy milk, which this year has increased in price. **A carton of milk or juice will cost 45 cents this year.** You will be notified of any changes in these prices if they occur. Watch for a school lunch menu coming home each month. There may be two versions of the School Lunch Menu. The first is just an 8 ½ X 11 sheet of paper with a calendar on it showing each day's menu. Another menu that may be provided for us to send home looks like a small comic book or activity book. These unfold and the menu is printed inside. In either case they will be sent home at the end of each month for the subsequent month.

Early Dismissal

There will be a day in mid to late September when Crossgates School will have an "early dismissal". This means students will be dismissed after approximately ½ day of school attendance. A special notice will be sent home with all students giving parents the exact date and times. **PLEASE WATCH FOR THIS NOTICE!**

We are giving you this advanced notice so you will watch for the detailed notice coming home in the near future.

EMERGENCY EVACUATION

In the rare instance when it is necessary to evacuate Crossgates, we are required to have a destination identified where students and staff can be housed until the building is clear or students are picked-up by parents. This may take place if we have a gas leak at the school, or a power outage during cold weather. If the situation arises, we will have our students and staff walk to Church of St. Andrew, 3620 Heatherdowns Blvd., (this is at the corner of Colony and Heatherdowns). Everyone will remain there until Crossgates is safe, or until they are picked-up. The telephone number at the church is 419-385-6160.

"What did you do in school today?"

Please make it a habit to ask your child the above question on a daily basis. In addition please watch for papers, booklets, newsletters, etc. coming home with your child throughout the year. Please take the time to review all of these items to keep yourself informed about your child's education. Parents are important partners with the school in ensuring the academic success of their child.

New Grade Cards

Students in grades 1-6 will be receiving new grade cards beginning this school year. (Kindergarten students began using this type of grade card last year.) They are called Standards Based Grade Cards and they show parents how their child is doing on the State of Ohio Standards, which drive the instruction in the classroom. To help parents become familiar with these cards and understand what the grade markings mean, there will be a series of in-services designed especially for parents. SEVEN HABITS OF HIGHLY RESPONSIBLE STUDENTS

1) **THEY SET GOALS.** Goals keep kids focused on the future. That's why they are the foundation of responsible behavior---and success in school. Help your child set goals.

 **How much improvement would you like to see on this week's test?**

 **How would you like to improve your grades this marking period?**

 **What are two things you would like to accomplish this school year?**

 **What will be needed to meet those goals?**

Goals help students focus on what's important and what's not. If they have a vision of where they want to go, they're more likely to get there. And students with goals find it easier to say "no" to irresponsible behaviors...because they are saying "yes" to their vision of the future.

2) **THEY PLAN THEIR TIME.** Responsible people meet their obligations—whether it's turning in a paper on the day it's due or having a report on the boss's desk when it's needed. But it takes planning. (Remember the old saying, "If you fail to plan, you plan to fail.") Help your child use a big calendar to organize his/her time. Write down all his/her commitments and use the calendar to plan time for homework each day. On

a day when he/she has soccer after school, he'll/she'll need to study after dinner—but the next day, when he/she has choir practice in the evening, he'll/she'll need to study right after school.

- 3) **THEY STUDY EVERY DAY.** Learning any subject is like building a brick wall—you do it steadily, one step at a time. Responsible students set aside time for homework or studying every day. On the day when your child's teacher assigns no homework, have him/her "assign himself/herself." That may be the day he/she reviews vocabulary words. Or he/she may take a few minutes to review notes.
- 4) **THEY TAKE NOTES IN CLASS.** Students who earn all "A"s seem to have one thing in common—they take notes in class. They learn that teachers will almost always spell out what they think is important (and what's likely to be on the test.) Teach your child to take notes when the teacher is talking. Spend time reviewing them before a test—and watch his/her grades go up.
- 5) **THEY HAVE THE TOOLS THEY NEED.** A carpenter wouldn't think of showing up without a hammer. A nurse always has a stethoscope. But some students seem to think they can go to class without pencils, paper and other tools they need.
- 6) **THEY KEEP THEIR COMMITMENTS.** Responsible people honor their commitments—to other and to themselves. They succeed in school by doing their assignments well and on time. They do their share of the group project. They go to soccer practice even when it's cold. You can teach your child about commitments by example. Talk with your child about the commitments you have made to the family—to provide meals, to keep clothes clean, to care for anyone who is sick. Ask your child to make commitments of his/her own at home. And help him/her feel the satisfaction that comes from meeting those commitments.
- 7) **THEY GET READY AHEAD OF TIME.** Some students start out every morning in a crisis. They can't find their homework. They don't have time to eat breakfast. The shirt they want to wear isn't ironed. Responsible students have learned that being late, or being early, is not something that simply happens to them. It is a choice they can make. Teach your child to take five or ten minutes before bedtime to get ready for the next day. Have him/her pack the backpack. Make lunch. Lay out clothes. He/she will soon see that those few minutes will make the morning easier... and help him/her get to school ready to learn.

HELP BUILD RESPONSIBLE HABITS IN 21 DAYS

Experts say that if we repeat an action every day for just 21 days, it is likely to become automatic. So, for the next 21 days, encourage your child to act on the habits of responsible students. He'll/She'll soon find he/she does them without even thinking. And he'll/she'll be more responsible—and more successful—in school as well!
